

## Childcare in Shiregreen

- In 2013, Sanctuary worked with national charity Fixers to try and fix the issue of lack of childcare provision in Shiregreen.
- By making local links with young parents through schools and community groups, a trip was arranged for interested parents to a local city farm.
- The group highlighted the need for childcare provision in Shiregreen and when the local Children's Centre closed, the demand became even higher.



- Sanctuary met with the Early Years Team from Sheffield City Council to identify and reduce barriers to people setting up as registered child minders. In 2014 Sanctuary provided funding to help train and register 11 local residents to set up as child-minders.
- The Shiregreen child-minders are now a trained and organised group, running weekly toddler sessions and each have permanent clients.

## Shiregreen Neighbourhood Centre

- In 2011 Councillor Jane Bird officially opened the centre after Sanctuary funded the transformation of its former offices.
- An asset owned by Sheffield City Council, Sanctuary funded the running costs of the building over five years. The Shiregreen Neighbourhood Centre committee raised more money each year to meet the running costs and by 2014 the centre was running independently.



- In 2015 the centres lease was transferred to local school Beck Primary. The space is now used for under 2 nursery provision. However, the school have retained the centre's community aspect, allowing half the building to be used by the community.
- Currently running at the centre are weekly toddler groups, adult learning courses and a social cafe.

## Shiregreen Scouts Hut



- In 2013 three apprentices from Sanctuary Maintenance Contractors Limited transformed an unused room at the back of the Scout hut into a new office that Scout Leaders can use for meetings and for storing paperwork.
- Staff from Sanctuary Housing joined members of the scouts to complete the makeover by decorating the room and fitting carpet tiles and installing the furniture.

***"The new room provides us with the facility to host our own meetings. The storage space has made a massive difference. Now we have more space available in the main hall to expand our indoor activities which benefits everybody in the group."*** Danny Levick, Scout Leader.



## Streetscene project



- As part of Sanctuary's regeneration of Shiregreen, a £13 million project was funded to transform nearly 15 miles of pavements, verges and public open spaces on the Shiregreen estate.

### The Streetscene project involved:

- ♦ Replacing more than 400 ageing or diseased trees
  - ♦ Creating green tarmac parking spaces
  - ♦ Installing 3,300 oak bollards
  - ♦ Decorating 78 original lampposts with ideas from the community
  - ♦ Putting in new plants to create attractive borders
  - ♦ Installing 1,100 new street lights
- Community artists Rednile worked with residents on art projects to encourage the community to take ownership of the local environment.
